

Kincaid Establishes \$2500 Scholarship for Ky. News Carriers

Richmond, Ky. — A \$2500 college scholarship program for Kentucky news carriers is being established by the Kentucky Central Life Insurance Company. It was announced last night by Charles D. Kincaid, president of the Lexington-based insurer.

Kincaid made the announcement here at dinner at Eastern Kentucky State College after being presented with a medal of appreciation by the national organization designating him as a member of the national newspaper industry.

The scholarship program would consist of five \$500 scholarships, one to be awarded each year. The first will be made this year.

The scholarships will be given on the basis of academic standing and extracurricular activities, plus the provision that the recipient has carried the newspaper for at least one year while attending high school. Nominations will be made by the newspaper for whom Kincaid delivered papers for more than eight years. Special guests at the gathering included Dr. Robert R. Martin, president of Eastern Kentucky State College, and several other dignitaries.

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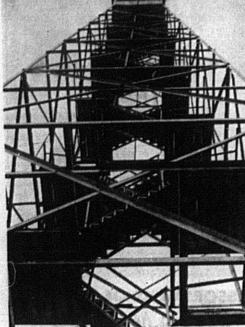
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State's Fire Defenses Ready For Business



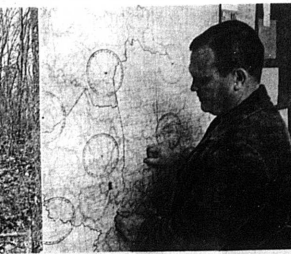
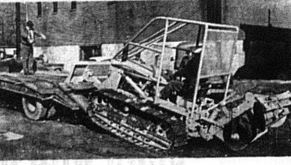
Preparedness is the keynote for employees of the Kentucky Department of Natural Resources Forestry Division. Readiness work gets underway at least a month in advance of the opening date of the Spring fire season.

Since 1960 the State protection system has been extended to cover 101 of the 120 counties and a total of 10,643,000 acres of forestlands. The remaining counties are less heavily forested and covered by a Federally-sponsored pilot program of trained "citizen firefighters."

As a result of the increased services available and modernized operations, forest fires in 1964 were reduced by 36 per cent and acreage burned dropped by 69 per cent from the previous year.

A tall and lonely outpost symbolizes Kentucky's alert forest protection program. There 154 such fire-watch towers criss-crossing the length and breadth of the state.

A small bulldozer that serves as a fire-pilot unit is already in service, clearing away dangerous brush and laying out trails. It is being loaded on a truck for readiness, to be transported to a hillside top step for other firefighting equipment to maneuver.



With two rakers following behind, the plow prepares to lay out a fire trail along a woody brush-and-tree stand area. This insures clear passage for men and equipment in case fire breaks out later on.

Walter Green, Eastern Kentucky fire-control supervisor, directs Forestry pilot Steve Karamer to test the readiness of one of the four airplanes now on hand for aerial fire-fighting. This is one of the two planes added to the State's fire control system last fall.



Under the 1965 Acreage-Poundage Program, fire-cured growers in the Georgia-Florida area, where regular season sales have been completed in the 28-market, sold less tobacco than a year ago but received almost \$11 million more; at the same time, less tobacco went into the Government loan program, as compared with loan activity a year earlier.

Fire-cured—the Secretary of Agriculture is required to announce the amount of the 1966 marketing quota on an acreage-poundage basis by Dec. 1, 1965.

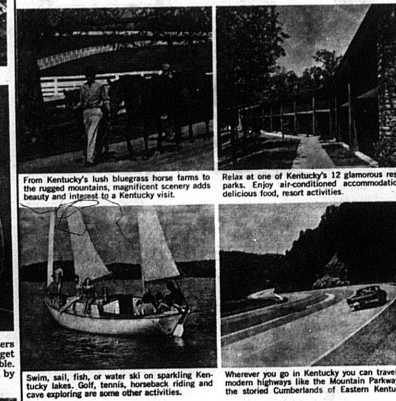
Burley, fire-cured, dark air-cured and sun-cured—marketing quotas on an acreage-allocation basis must be announced by Feb. 1, 1966. (These quotas were approved for the next three crops in grower referendums held in Feb. 1964 and Feb. 1965). Under the new acreage-poundage law enacted April 1965, if the Secretary determines that the new quotas would result in a more effective program, he can also announce acreage-poundage quotas for these

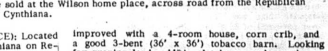
