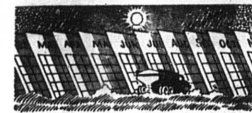

**J. P. Ross** Services for John Parker Ross, 65, who died Friday, were conducted at 2 p.m. Sunday at the Mather-Shearer Chapel



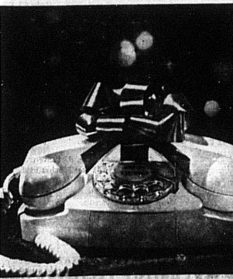
### 313 days to apply limestone
