Dr. Russell Stauffer, teacher at the University of Delaware and editor of "The Reading Teacher," was the consultant, discussing the use of new skills and techniques in teaching of reading. Over 65? File Your Claim Now

Many persons over age 65 who will be eligible for Medicare starting in July 1966, are not filing the claims necessary to establish eligibility, according to Ernest F. Fitzpatrick, Social Security District Manager in Lexington.

Fitzpatrick points out that, with few exceptions, all individuals over age 65 are eligible for hospital benefits without cost to them. Also, all individuals over age 65 have the option of paying a premium of \$3.00 per month for medical insurance benefits to help with doctor's bills. He emphasized that if an individual is not now receiving Railroad Retirement or Social Security benefits, that the filing of the claim is required to establish eligibility.

Action now will put either or both plans into effect next July. Delay can be costly. The Lexington Social Security Office, located at 950 Winchester Road in Lexington, is open 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Thursday and from 9:00 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. on Friday.
