

For A Safe Halloween

Frankfort (SPECIAL). For a fire-safe Halloween, the trick is to treat youngsters to a hazard inspection before they go out for their evening of fun.

The Fire Marshal's Office reminds parents that there are painful burns and even more tragic accidents waiting to pounce on children if they carry candlelight pumpkins or wear flimsy costumes that can ignite easily.

Parents are urged to keep this Halloween fire safe for their children by heeding these important precautions:

1. Use a flashlight—Never a candle—to light the pumpkin which the children carry. A candle-lit pumpkin is hazardous indoors too; it can easily set fire to curtains or table decorations.
2. In buying or making costumes, stay away from flimsy materials, baggy sleeves and billowing skirts... the smallest spark or touch of flame can start them burning. Wigs and masks with fibrous "hair" are possible fire hazards and should be avoided. Dark-colored fabrics increase the danger of children not being seen by motorists; a much safer choice is a light-colored costume.
3. Costumes, if more thought, should be flame-proof. This process, which may also be done at

LET'S LOOK IT OVER

Frankfort—I want Kentucky to get \$4.5 million in Federal matching funds to put with \$4.5 million of the proposed state bond issue to carry out a new capital construction program worth more than \$9 million toward the state parks system.

Do you want this? I want Kentucky to get \$6 million in Federal matching funds to put with \$2.5 million in bond money to have a total of \$8.5 million for educational, preventive and research programs in mental illness and retardation.

Do you want this? If you do want these things, if you do want to put up \$176 million in bonds to get more than \$600 million in new and better roads, in new and better educational facilities, and in expansion of our state services, vote "YES" for the bond issue on November 2.

He has pointed out in preceding columns that \$159 million in bonds will buy Kentucky 3750 million worth of roads, and that \$21,950,000 in bonds will provide for \$95,585,000 worth of new and improved educational facilities.

It is what would remain of the bond issue and of matching funds that I consider today, of those amounts that are earmarked for parks and for health and welfare, for agriculture and for sports, for corrections and other departments.

The bond issue will make possible the construction of complete vacation resort facilities at Barkley Lake and the State at the state fairgrounds. Facilities at all existing parks and shrines can be expanded and several new park sites will become available for development within two years.

The parks program will enable Kentucky to retain its leadership in state park resort development and continue to attract millions of tourists in its tourist and travel industry. Kentucky's tourist business in 1964 amounted to \$346 million of which \$228 million was spent by travelers from other states.

Small lakes development and additions to the forest fire protection system will receive a total of \$1,100,000 from the issue.

Flood protection and water for municipal, agricultural and recreational uses will account for \$2.5 million of that, and forest fire protection for the remainder.

The \$8.5 million total in mental health funds would be used for grants to localities for construction of mental health centers and a State hospital for care of the severely retarded.

Totals of \$1,600,000 would go to county health centers; \$450,000 to child welfare centers and \$250,000 to the Hazlewood Tuberculosis Hospital at Louisville for a new central-heating and air-conditioning system. The health center would be used for new construction and additions, and the child welfare funds for new construction.

The \$305,000 earmarked for the Department of Aeronautics in the bond issue proposal will be matched by \$1,500,000 in Federal and other funds to provide for a total of \$2,005,000 to be expended for new airports and airstrips and for making improvements at existing facilities over the state.

By receiving a total of \$1 million in bond money and Federal funds, the Department of Agriculture would be enabled to build a modern animal disease diagnostic laboratory and to combine it with the livestock show and sales pavilion. One of the State College and the State at the state fairgrounds at Louisville.

Bond money totaling \$2.5 million would be allotted to the Department of Corrections for construction of these projects:

Two farm barracks complexes, one at the State Penitentiary at Lexington and the other at the State Penitentiary at Fiddleyville; two forestry camps for selected inmates from the state penal institutions; and renovation of both the State Penitentiary at Fiddleyville and the State Penitentiary at Lexington.

Good Kentucky State Police Safety now has units in 16 localities. Barracks buildings in five of the places are under construction. \$300,000 would be used to build permanent

barracks in three communities.

All of these facilities are needed for the health and well-being and future prosperity of Kentucky and her citizens. They can be obtained most economically and most feasibly with passage of the bond issue November 2.

BLUE JETS
Downed by Tigers 12-0

PRESES ROLLING ON 1965 INCOME TAX FORMS
Louisville.-- The Internal Revenue Service announced that printing of 1965 income tax forms and instructions has started today at the Government Printing Office.

Taxpayers will receive their tax form packages as usual, about January 15. Instructions will be included with each package as will be a special sample pamphlet containing most of the forms and order blanks late in October.

The Revenue Service said that the new forms and instructions contain several revisions for the convenience of taxpayers and the government.

A significant addition to the instructions for Form 1040 is a new section on page 2 designated "Important New Features."

New features referred to in the number of tax tables from 5 to 3, to make it easier to find the correct tax; (2) state sales tax credits and gasoline tax rates for deduction purposes; and (3) an explanation of the combat pay exclusion for servicemen in Vietnam.

Type face and typography have been revised on both Forms 1040 and 1040A. In addition, first names of children have been retained on both forms as well as space provided on both for entering the employer's name. The new Form 1040A also now requires the employer's address.

The giant presses of the Government printing Office will require 10 weeks to complete the entire printing task, using 10 million sheets of 200 pound paper, and 70,000 pounds of ink.

Not only does the Government Printing Office produce the Internal Revenue 42 million Form 1040's, but GPO also produces almost a billion other forms needed by the IRS. The plant's capacity and that of 40 other commercial printers located throughout the United States.
