SCS Issues Study of Water Problems

A 16-page publication entitled "Water and the Land" has just been issued by the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service.

It tells where the U.S. water supply comes from, how it is used and misused, and what can be done to conserve and develop it, says the UK Cooperative Extension Service.

It points out that while the water supply, over the years, remains constant, use of it has grown steadily. In 1950, the average daily use for all purposes rose from 600 gallons per capita in 1900 to 1,200 gallons in 1950 and to 1,500 gallons in 1960. Projections show that by 1970, the average daily use per capita will be 1,800 gallons, a 50% increase over the 1900 level.

While there is no national water shortage, there are serious water problems nearby where, the publication states, the water is used for domestic, industrial, and agricultural purposes.
