Burley Tobacco

Burley tobacco (Type 31) was 101 years old in 1965 and it continues to contribute heavily toward the income of the Nicholas county farmer. Radish, cars, clothes, food and others are paid for from income derived from this crop. It is often referred to as the "bread & butter" crop.

In 1964 tobacco contributed \$3,270, 937 from 2790 acres averaging with 1965 lbs. per acre of 5,468,000 pounds for \$59.92 per hundred, to the Nicholas County economy. Remove this from the agricultural income and we would be hard pressed to seek other income. Yet growers are aware of the difficult times ahead. Since tobacco is a luxury item, it has always maintained its place in the economy and we will continue to have our problem.

The 1963 agricultural income found tobacco supporting Nicholas County farmers about 70% of the total agricultural income. It behooves everybody to do a good job with such an important crop.

While all of this is helpful we need support in continuing a tobacco program. The support program which tobacco has carried for over 20 years has never cost the taxpayers one dime. We have always paid off our debts and most of the time interest on the debt. Therefore we have a good record but as you know many people are criticizing us. It is a common belief that the tobacco farmer is making big money. Did you know that for land, labor, and capital it is costing the tobacco grower about 35 cents per pound to put tobacco on the warehouse floor and to get things we buy have gone up. The price for tobacco has not risen nearly so fast.

In my opinion there are four ways which we can help ourselves:

1. Quality tobacco. Once lost it is extremely difficult to regain a market. There is tremendous demand for useful tobacco which is highly absorbent character and with good taste and aroma. You have watched the buying trends in recent years. WARNING: Continue to watch it. Buyers are not buying the stick stiff tobacco. It can be purchased in other markets.
2. Efficient production. Reduce cost of production. This is one area where we are frugal with our resources. Costs can be lowered in fertilizer, spacing machinery and we would be hard pressed to seek other income.
3. Over mechanized vs. under-mechanized. Too many and too big tractors are charged off tobacco. This is not a good idea. We need more power units for the tobacco crop.
4. Advertisements. We have the finest product in the world. We know this but what about farmers to know. Yes, let's tell the world about burley tobacco. Some interesting facts you might like to know about tobacco and tobacco products:
 1. Over 70 million Americans bought 530 billion cigarettes in 1965.
 2. Tobacco users spent over \$4 billion for cigarettes and other tobacco products.
 3. 750,000 farm families in 21 states received over \$1 billion for tobacco crops.
 4. Federal, State, and Local taxes collected from tobacco products over \$3 billion.
 5. Tobacco is the fifth largest crop in the United States, behind corn, soybeans.
 6. Over 96,000 are employed in tobacco manufacturing plants.
 7. Over 1.5 million businesses supply the tobacco industry with equipment, materials, transportation, distributing and merchandising services in every part of the country.

Ground Breaking Ceremonies Set

Ground breaking ceremonies are scheduled for Kentucky Utility Appreciation Week, April 17, for a \$750,000 plant for Blue Grass Industries, Inc. in Mt. Sterling.

The new plant will be located on a 66-acre site between U. S. Highway 60 and Interstate 64, one mile east of Mt. Sterling. The site is owned by Blue Grass Industries, Inc. The company plans call for a 54,000 square foot building to be ready for occupancy in October, 1966. Wayne Shumate, president of BGI disclosed.

Mr. Shumate stated the new facility will provide employment in Montgomery and surrounding counties. The building will pave the way for eventual blue grass industries to 500 persons.

Blue Grass Industries began operations in Mt. Sterling in January, 1955 in the Lolla G. Lawrence building on High Street. Mrs. Carrie Shumate, corporate secretary and general manager, left Carlisle for over a year to manage the set-up program in Mt. Sterling. The plant there began with 25 operators.

Due to increased production, a warehouse was rented last year, then converted to a manufacturing facility.

Since 1964, the plant has increased employment from 80 to 200 employees.

Mr. Shumate said the new plant is a "dream come true" for Blue Grass Industries personnel. It was made possible by not having a playing field. The baseball field was absorbed by the addition of the new wing and football field which was completed this past fall. The team has been hampered by cold weather and no practice field. Much of this year's effort have been conducted inside.

The Blue Jackets schedule has been cut down some due to having to play all games away from home. At the present time there are 15 games on this year's schedule. This year's squad was his hard by graduation as last years squad had a number of outstanding a.s.i.o.s. Last years team posted a 11-2 record.
