The retirement of Colonel James B. Leer, Deputy Commander of the XIV United States Army Corps, followed announcement of an award of the Legion of Merit to him during a special weekend ceremony at Fort Sheridan, Illinois, on behalf of President Johnson, Lieutenant General John H. Michaelis, Commanding General of the 14th United States Army, chief Colonel Lear for 20 years, sound judgment and professional ability in intrinsic value to the success of military objectives at regional and operational levels.

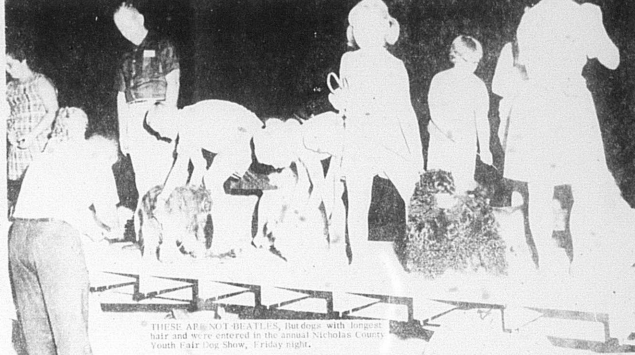
