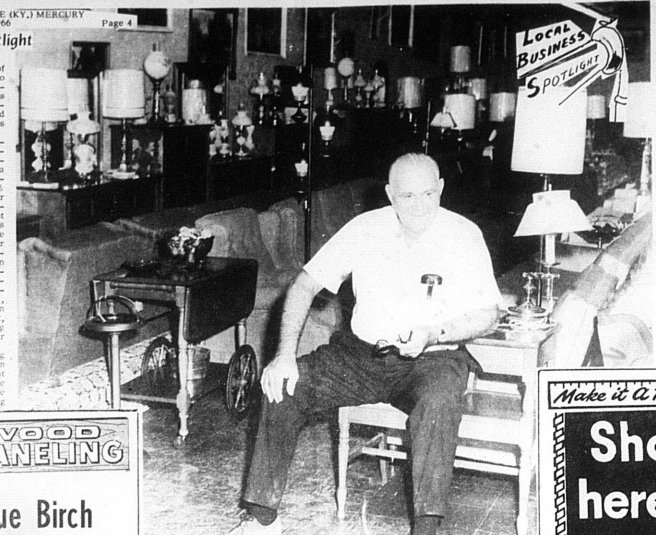


**This Weeks Spotlight**

A lightning protection system, properly designed and installed, will safely escort a lightning bolt into the ground or dissipate it into the air. For this reason, safety specialists recommend such a system for farm buildings.

Be sure a qualified contractor installs your lightning protection system, and insist on a "Master Label" job. This label is awarded after a check that involves both the Underwriters' Laboratories and the manufacturer has made sure that the installer has done his job properly.

After the system is installed, you'll need to check it occasionally yourself. Look for bent, loose or missing rods, broken conductor cables, and loose connecting clamps. If you add another building, be sure to have it checked with the system.

**Goodwill**  
Richard V. Bergen of 505 Spence Drive, Park Hills, Ky., has been appointed manager of the Northern Kentucky Goodwill Industries Rehabilitation Center, Covington, Ky. It was announced today by W. Sharon Florer, executive director of Ohio Goodwill Industries.

House and Garden Plant Lexington—House and garden pests are still having their usual summer field day, says Dr. R.L. Miller, UK Cooperative Extension Service entomologist.

Tomato Mites: These cause color-loss in leaves and some curling under the underside. Use Malathion or Kelthane, and follow label directions on safety and application methods.

Check plants again later, to see if eggs have hatched into a new infestation. Hold a piece of paper under the plant and shake the plant. This will dislodge live mites which can be seen on the paper.

Poisoner Bugs: These are small, red bugs on boxelder trees, and a household pest in the winter. They're presumably fed only on boxelder trees but have been found in some cases in gardens. Use DDT according to label directions for control.

Petunia Cutworm: This cutworm, a small pest, eats leaves and flowers of petunia during the night. Spray DDT according to label directions.

Stay Beetle: This brown, hard-shelled black-headed beetle is feeding on pinelinks, lindens and other plants in the garden. This is the adult of the grub worm. For control, use Sevintor-Malathion or DDT. Apply as spray according to label directions for leaf-feeding insects.
