## LET'S LOOK IT OVER

Frankfort--I have always put education first. That is one of the many reasons I now strongly advocate adoption of Kentucky's proposed new constitution in the November election.

To meet competition from other states and to provide for increases in teacher's salaries have been provided during my administration without any increase in state taxes. Steps simultaneously have been taken to improve the quality of instruction - but you know and I know this is not enough.

It is more important now than ever, with increased support for education by state and federal governments, that we provide a continuity of effort and continuity of the quality leadership in our state department of education.

Kentucky's present constitution goes back beyond the days of the McCaffey reaper and the old blue back speller. It calls for a new constitution, which was imposed by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, with a deep feeling that it will make one of the finest fishing lakes in this section of the country.

We entered Lake Harkey from Kentucky Lake which we had flitted the day before. On my first cast I hooked a bluegill. After a while we decided to try some sport fishing and traveled by car along a newly-paved road running the length of the 170,000 acres that make up the Land Between the Lakes. Many of the fish are not "keepers" yet but in a year

the new constitution also would do away with a restriction in the present document which makes it impossible for school districts, as well as cities and counties, to borrow money at interest rates available to private industry.

This will result in a savings of millions of dollars that may be used for other school construction purposes, such as new and improved buildings.

Distinct advantage to public education in the new charter, too, is the removal of the four-year limit to appointive terms, which will permit future governing boards of colleges and universities to be staggered so that no one governor can appoint full boards in one term.

And if I may, I want to repeat here the pledge I made in August 10 speech to the Leadership Conference of the Kentucky Education Association, which endorsed and urged teacher support of the new constitution. What I said then was:

## Mail Order Law Enforcement

Frankfort - Kentucky citizens are taking quickly in the concept of mail-order law enforcement, Kentucky State Police reports.

Post Office Box #10, Frankfort, Ky., in an address used by State Police since last December to which citizens may report crimes and remain anonymous.

"We are grateful for the response," Bassett added, "and the indication is that the public is alert to crime detection."

State Police Director Col. James E. Bassett says, "Thirteen arrests resulted from the first 50 letters. Charges have been placed for such crimes as murder, arson, prostitution and alcoholic beverage violation."

The letters have dealt with Kentucky crimes and have come from all over the state as well as from Tennessee and Ohio.

"Surprisingly, there have been a few crank letters," Bassett said. "We investigate all complaints."

He said nearly all the letters express gratitude for the opportunity to report crimes and remain anonymous.

A good field of corn cut in the tassled stage for silage will make about 13 1/2 tons, but make 20 tons cut in full-tassel. When the water has leached out, silage is superior, the 13 1/2 tons make about 1 1/2 tons of actual dry-matter, the 20 tons of full-tassel make about 6 1/2 tons of dry matter.

Energy value for the full-tassel crop is about 40 per cent higher than tassled silage.

Keep chopper knives sharp for a "finy, clean cut," Thompson advises. Patch the silage tightly to keep out air. Add water to the silage as you fill it, if necessary on dry crops (such as might be encountered this year).

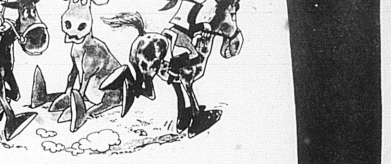
"You can nearly double the value of a corn crop by making silage instead

of picking the grain and leaving the stalks in the field," he says.
