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### More Deer For Hunters

Frankfort, Ky., Nov. 10 (Special) — Ctober marked the start of the ninth deer trapping season conducted on Mammoth Cave National Park in cooperation with the National Park Service and the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. Minor Clark, commissioner, said today.

During the past eight trapping seasons, 36 Kentucky counties were stocked with 2,778 Mammoth Cave Park. Many of these counties are now open to hunting as a result of successful trapping.

With the removal of over 2,500 deer speculation has arisen as to how many still remain within Mammoth Cave Park. Park rangers and state wildlife biologists sought this answer last February when deer drives were conducted on the park, assisted by Great West Job Corp personnel. These drives showed that approximately 3,000 deer inhabit the park. Trapping records indicate that more than half of the deer caught are does. Simple arithmetic shows that if each doe produced only one fawn a year, the population would increase by at least one million deer this year, even if deer die at a population explosion.

The gradual increase in the deer herd has been evident for a number of years to state and park service biologists through studies conducted on the vegetation within the park. In 1957, state biologists initiated 100 permanently marked plots in the park. Each spring, a biologist checks the amount of each plant eaten by deer. These studies show that plants

### Farm Expenses To Be Higher

Lexington — Higher farm production expenses in 1967 and a probable decrease in government farm payments may lower farmers' realized net farm income in 1967, according to a statement in the U.S. Cooperative Extension Service agricultural economics department's bi-weekly outlook.

The anticipated drop may be as much as 5 percent from the estimated \$16.1 billion of 1966, says John H. Bondurant, agricultural economist.

With normal weather conditions, however, cash receipts from farm marketing probably will increase, the report says.

Expanded feed and food crop acreage will be largely responsible. Bondurant also sees a larger total amount of credit to finance farm production than in 1966, particularly for short-term and intermediate-term farm loans. Farmers' realized net farm income in 1967, he said, probably will be lower than in 1966, but only 10 percent in the Appalachian region (Kentucky, West Virginia, North Carolina and Tennessee). Farm mortgage debt figure in U.S. farm assets as of Jan. 1, 1967 probably will reach \$27.5 billion, up 7.2 percent from 1966. Total farm liabilities probably will increase 14.4 percent in 1967.
