For almost a lifetime, the woman had stood on the threshold of the Catholic Church—uncertain whether to come in or stay out.
"Seemingly," she says, "I was born, loving the Catholic Church." This she attributes to a "small miracle," inasmuch as her parents were not Catholic, or even religious, and "our relatives and friends were none of them Catholics."

It is unfortunate, but true, that people seeking knowledge of the Catholic Church encounter a "wall of obstacles" as this woman did. The reason is, usually, that so many of the "facts" they hear about the Catholic Church are not facts at all, but misrepresentations or fruits of misunderstanding. Even those who admit and respect the Church . . . and who wish to hold fast to its sentiments of tolerance and good-will, will often be confused and deceived.
