Falmouth is only an "infinitesimal" part of the project. What, then, is the real reason for destroying most of eight Kentucky counties, flooding the most fertile farmlands of the Commonwealth, and evicting thousands of helpless, helpless rural people? One must conclude that it is not for flood-control, nor, primarily, for the pleasure or profit of Kentuckians.

Now I can fathom our better sacrificed on the altar of political expediency of our leaders, but offering us a pleasurable, prosperous, productive, valley for the pleasure and convenience of an out-of-state city,

with no political overtones, is beyond my "poor, power to comprehend." Also, beyond my comprehension is the food-producing potential of this region. It is a sobering thought that our Agricultrists say "flood-gates" is the number one problem for the years immediately ahead. Starvation faces us along with the rest of the world unless the food supply can be increased. Our horticulturists say that our native man has been destroying irrevocably the food-producing power of his land. The WorldTeachth Organization warns that the implosion of rural dwellers leaving the land for the city is creating catastrophic health problems.

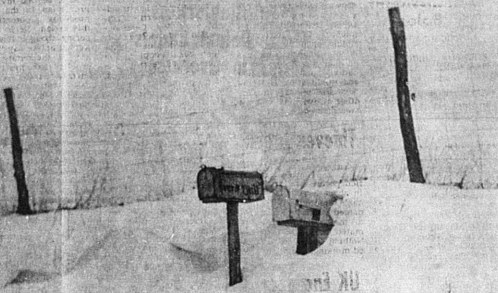
