Owners Must List Property For Taxes By March 1

Kentucky Revenue Commissioner J. E. Luckett today reminded property owners that they are required by the county tax commissioner before March 1. The Commissioner called attention to the Kentucky Court of Appeals ruling of June 8, 1965, requiring that districts reduce their tax rates to the point where they will produce no more property tax revenue in 1966 than was produced in 1965. Additionally, the General Assembly enacted rate-limiting legislation which requires that every local taxing district—county, a school and special district—reduce their tax rates to approximately the same state property tax revenue in 1966 as in 1965, Luckett said.

A county, city, or local district school revenue for any taxing district shall not be increased, except for the first Monday in May, he could lose his right to appeal the assessment made by the county tax commissioner. In speaking of the Kentucky Court of Appeals ruling, Luckett stressed that the ruling did not change the property tax laws, tax structure, or the total property tax burden.
