out causing you discomfort, you're wrong again. That much set-back in room temperature takes too much fuel to make up the temperature difference in the morning. A 6- or 7- degree set-back might help, however.

Have you heard that heating the basement does nothing for the upstairs? Again, this is wrong. Even a small heating-coil in the basement can help provide a cushion of warm air just under the first floor.

Finally, some people think they're saving money by turning off the pilot light in the summer. But this, too, is a wrong notion. The pilot light prevents corrosion in the furnace caused by condensation -- the corrosion will result in more expense in the long run than in small amount of fuel used by the pilot light.
