

## 4-H Lake May Open For Public Fishing During September

Carlisle--The lake which is part of the North Central 4-H Club Camp northeast of Carlisle may be open to the public for fishing in September, according to Dr. Ray Rana, Chairman of University of Kentucky Extension 4-H Program.

The decision on whether or not to permit fishing in the lake by the general public this fall will be based on recommendations of the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife, he said. The Department will check the lake after the 4-H camping season ends in August and make recommendations on whether or not more fishing should be allowed this year.

## To Unveil Bedinger Marker

The Kentucky Historical Marker Society plans to unveil a marker at Blue Licks, near the Blue Licks Christian Church, for Major George Michael Bedinger a former resident of this area, Saturday July 9, at 11 a.m.

Mr. Bedinger was one of the early residents and a very progressive gentleman from the following facts found in Collier's History of Kentucky. It is well to remember that life in the Kentucky wilderness was hazardous and that only brave and hardy men and women had the strength and fortitude to meet, endure and survive the many hardships and handicaps that existed at that time. Our heroic predecessor, George Michael Bedinger was born in York County, Penn., December 10, 1756. He migrated with his parents, sisters and brothers to Shepherdstown, Virginia, here he

later married his first wife, Nancy Sarah Keene in 1782. At the birth of their first child, a daughter, Sarah Keene Bedinger in 1787 Mrs. Bedinger died, the child survived.

In 1779 Mr. Bedinger migrated to Boone County, Kentucky. He participated in two events that proved he was a fearless gentleman. Collier's History says he was the youngest major in the Battle of Blue Licks, August 19,

1782 and that he was in Bowman's Expedition in 1779. Mr. Collins states that in both "He proved himself a brave, prompt and efficient officer."

In 1791 Mr. Bedinger built his new home near Blue Licks in what was then Bourbon County. Part of this house is standing today.

In 1792 Major Bedinger was a member of the First Legislature of Kentucky at Lexington. He was a Representative in Congress for four years 1803-1807.

In 1795 Major Bedinger married a second time, Miss Henrietta Clay of Bourbon County, a daughter of Henry J. Clay and Rachel Powell Clay. They were the parents of 10 children.

Major Bedinger and family were probably the most progressive and enterprising residents of this area. According to Perrin's History of Bourbon, Scott, Harrison and Nicholas Counties this statement is proved: he owned the first water mill

## North Central 4H Camp Dedication Scheduled For Sunday, July 10

Lexington--Kentucky's North Central 4-H Club Camp, located northeast of Carlisle in Nicholas County, will be officially dedicated Sunday afternoon, July 10. All interested persons in the 27-county area served by the camp are invited to attend, according to Dr. Ray H. Rana, chairman of UK Extension 4-H programs.

Rev. Lucian Robinson, pastor of the Gardendale Christian Church in Lexington and a former 4-H member, will be the speaker at the 3 p.m. dedication ceremony. Also part of the program will be the presentation of a U.S. flag which has flown over the Capitol in Washington, D.C., obtained for the camp through Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey.

The camp facilities, 1,200 acres site which includes a small lake, was opened for campers last summer. Although more funds are needed to complete the camp's facilities, 1,200 4-H members attended camp sessions there last year and even more are expected this summer. Several groups not connected with 4-H also have used the camp.

Funds provided thus far by 4-H members and friends of 4-H in the area have built 21 cabins, a shelter house, a dining room and kitchen, a

swimming pool and two bath houses, and a caretaker's house.

"Camping is one of the highlights of the 4-H year," according to Dr. Rana. "It gives 4-H young people experience in group living, specialized training in citizenship and leadership, and a chance to gain new knowledge and make new friends--as well as the fun of camp life. The 27 county area served by the new North Central 4-H Camp now has 27,000 4-H members as well as many other boys and girls who now have the opportunity to benefit from the enjoyable, educational experience of 4-H camping.

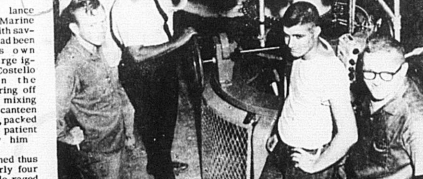
