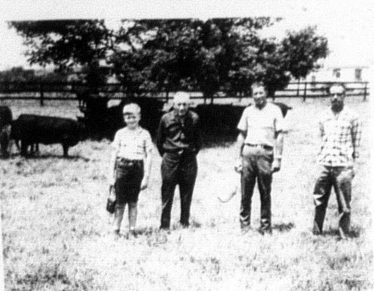
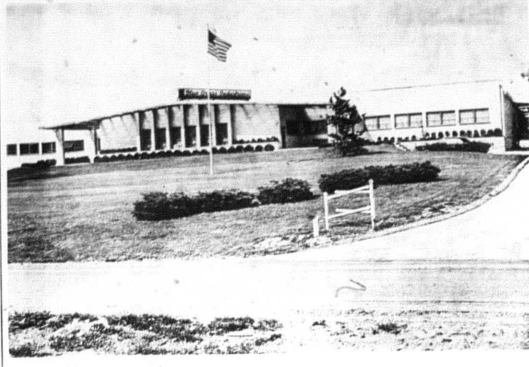


Bi-county Beef Cattle Field Day



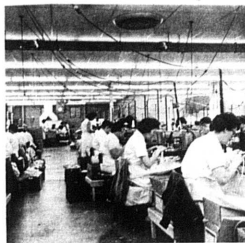

PLENTY OF POWER is supplied through overhead plug-in busway. This eventually will replace all drop cords from ceiling.



OVERHEAD DUCTS supply cool 80 F air to various zones of production area. Note outlet in dropped acoustical ceiling. Total of 160 tons of cooling capacity is required in production area. Offices have additional 2 1/2 tons. Pleasant temperature allows the workers to dress neatly and comfortably.

S SPREADING ALFALFA

A creeping alfalfa or one that spreads by underground roots is being developed by the University of Kentucky. The parent of the left has already bloomed out while the creeping variety on the right is a little later but has spread from a plot three feet wide to one about six feet wide by producing new plants. It spreads by sending up new plants along the lateral root system of the mother plant. A small plot of the new variety will be seeded in Nicholas County next year. It will be a few years before the variety is ready to be released for field production.

Sky Lift Has Business Looking Up

Visiting any of Kentucky's 35 state parks is an uplifting experience, but Jenny Wiley State Park near Prestonsburg, Ky., has added a literal dimension to that idea. They've installed a chair lift ski ride that lands on an otherwise inaccessible mountain top.

For \$1.50 (Children under 13, \$1) visitors can take a scenic and exciting 470-foot trip from a point near the park beach (just off Ky-304) to the top of Sugar Camp Mountain and back. From the mountain top you get a spectacular view of nearly 60 miles in all directions.

Aside from the view, the mountain top offers hiking trails, pony rides, refreshments, picnic facilities, and a Ferris wheel. From the Ferris wheel (called as the world's highest), you can look out a hundred miles across the mist-shrouded peaks and valleys of Kentucky's lovely Eastern Highlands.

The lift is in operation every day from 11 a.m. until 9 p.m. from September 15 through October 14. It will operate only on weekends in favorable weather.
