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Burley Crop
Burley tobacco is still under the acreage allotment program which permits a farmer to market all tobacco produced on the farm allotment, penalty free and, if eligible, it carries price-support. In 1965 all growers produced approximately 586 million pounds on 274,205 acres for a yield of 2,116 pounds per acre. Kentucky harvested 180,521 acres that had a yield of 2,160 pounds per acre selling for an average price of \$66.23 per hundred, \$258,246,121.76 were brought into Kentucky as a result of this program.

MAY BOND SALES
Roger Womack, Chairman of Nicholas County, reports today that the sales of Series E and H Savings Bonds for May were \$6,676 and reached \$57,810 for the year. The County's annual goal is \$133,600.

Dow Study Tour Continues

The twelve extraction agents who are participating in the Southern tour of the world's largest U.S. sponsored by the Dow Chemical Company, have been greatly surprised by the tremendous influence of agriculture on the total economy everywhere the group visits.

Agriculture is responsible for many jobs in every county for hundreds and in many cases, thousands of local people. Many jobs indirectly related to farming and agriculture are also created as a result of agricultural production. There are many jobs in a farmer's gasoline for his tractor, a brooder for a poultry house, roofing to cover his barn, or thousands of others. The influence on the local economy is evident in every state, county, and parish we have visited.

A good example of the value of agriculture to the local community was displayed at Morton, Mississippi. We toured the B. and G. Mill in which 2500 tons of poultry feed are mixed each week. This one mill supplies feed for more than 20 million chickens in the area. Poultry in South County, Mississippi (where Morton is located) means 20 million dollars income annually. Can you imagine just how much this amount of money means to a single town?

How many additional jobs are created? And how much business is stimulated?

We also saw a poultry by-products plant in Morton where all of the feathers and other unwanted parts of chickens are converted into fertilizer which farmers can purchase and put their livestock.
