

Conviction Rate

Frankfort, Ky., — The highest average conviction rate on record for State Police traffic violation charges has drawn praise from Kentucky's public safety commissioner.

Commissioner Glenn Lovers, commented "This indicated that court officials more and more are recognizing their responsibility in this problem area, and that there is better preparation and handling of such cases."

"Particularly, when law enforcement officers are confronted with rising traffic death and accident rates and are exerting great efforts to curb traffic violation, the court's record provides great encouragement to these officers."

Nearly three-fourths or 73 per cent-of the

rate is running ahead of 1965's when a total of 916 persons died. Last fourth of July week, 12 persons were killed; 15 could be expected to be killed this coming weekend, based on the current traffic death rate. But the Public Safety Department would not prevent the probable toll. Lovers expressed "real hope" motorists can keep the count down.

Southern Bell Adds 88 New Phones In County

Southern Bell Telephone Company today announced that it plans to spend \$31.8 million in 1966 to provide more and better telephone service in Kentucky.

"This reflects a continuous growth throughout the state," said C. Hunter Green, vice president for Kentucky said. "Telephone demand throughout the state continues heavy, requiring very heavy capital investments for the present and future and earnings that will support the raising of the necessary capital."

He said the \$31.8 million to be spent in 1966 would "help stimulate and support Kentucky's economic progress as well as provide the telephone service that facilitates any economy."

Southern Bell serves 687,000 telephones in Kentucky now and expects to serve 724,500 by the end of 1966.

At the end of the 1965 year, there were 179,3 telephones in Nicholas County, an increase of 88 over the total telephones in 1965.

MOBILE CHEST X-RAY UNIT. The Nicholas County Health Department is announcing that the Mobile X-Ray Unit donated to the State Health Department of Kentucky by the Kentucky Elks Association will be located at the Health Center on August 3, 1966 from 10 a.m. to 12 noon and 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. X-ray for tuberculosis all persons over 18 years of age. Those under 18 years of age may be x-rayed if previous tuberculin tests show a positive reaction or if they are referred by their private physician. The x-ray is free of charge and no dressing is required. Since 1941, when the Kentucky Elks Association presented the State Health Department its first mobile x-ray unit, more than 3,500,000 Kentuckians have been x-rayed and the death rate from tuberculosis has dropped from 66.3 percent per 100,000 persons to 9.2 percent. Dr. R. F. Reynolds, Health Officer, urges Nicholas Countians to take advantage of the opportunity for a chest x-ray.
