Wesley Excerpts

The state Court of Appeals yesterday declared illegal the ouster of Nicholas County School Superintendent Raymond J. Wesley, saying the vote of 80 per cent of the school board's membership was required to take such action.

Wesley was removed by a vote of the board, which was formed by merger of the Carlisle and Nicholas County systems. The court said a law which required a vote of four members to oust a superintendent applied to the usual five-member board, but that is less than half the amount Wesley could have claimed had he not retired last Sept. 1.

This law was amended by the 1966 legislature, effective June 10, to require a vote of five members to remove a superintendent.
