over-fertilization too; the disease seems worse in heavily fertilized lawns.

- 1) If disease remains, remove clippings by raking or catching during cutting. Clippings can spread the disease.
- 2) As weather warms up, water grass so it is dry by night. Also, water once a week if possible and try to keep the moisture in the upper six inches of soil.
- 3) As disease becomes too heavy, spray with a fungicidal fungicide. Recommended ones are Fungon, Terracot or Captan.
- 4) Follow the directions in the label. However never use a mercury fungicide on Merion variety. It will kill the Merion. The disease is not

an ever-year visitor, Dr. Poole says. It is worse when there has been a long, wet spring followed by periods of warm weather.

TABLERITE STEAKS... FOR BARBQUE TREATS!

Start your charcoal fire 45 to 50 minutes ahead to allow charcoal to have an easy glow by day or a ruddy red after dark. Broiling time depends on thickness of meat. Adjust to your preference of doneness. Cook thinner steaks closer to heat, thicker steaks further from heat to allow longer cooking. A good average rule to follow is: "1" steaks—" from heat; broil 5-8 minutes each side, depending on steaks. "2" steaks—" from heat; broil 9-12 minutes each side, depending on steaks. "3" steaks—" from heat; broil 12-15 minutes each side, depending on steaks. The argument goes on—Season before or after? Either way works well. Try broiling steaks with oil and vinegar dressing or broil plain and brush with butter and lemon.
