**Dow Study Tour Continues**

The County Agents' Tour by Thomas S. Swann, Jr., the annual Professional-Improvement Tour for county agricultural Extension agents is sponsored by the Dow Chemical Company of Midland, Michigan. The Extension agents from Kentucky are selected each year to participate in the tour.

There are four separate tours to different parts of the country. The other Kentucky agent was designated to go on the Northern tour and I was designated to go on the Southern tour.

This tour will cover various interesting areas of Arkansas, Missouri, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina, Tennessee, and Kentucky, to study various types of agriculture in each state. An agent from each of these states plus an agent from Florida, Texas, and Oklahoma make up the group on this southern tour. I must say that this is one of the finest groups of men I have ever traveled with.

Our schedule is very crowded and there is hardly any free time at all, we are always moving. We are traveling in two station wagons.

There is never a dull moment. We are privileged to have a livestock enterpriser in the group. He is C. E. Carroll, the Extension agent from Shreveport, La. I really like to be the author of "Job Hope's" "jokebook". He is covered at a lot of words or a good joke. I'm sure that most all of the agents in the whole country know Ted, as he is known.

Our group assembled at Little Rock, Ark., on Sunday afternoon, June 5, to become acquainted and to discuss plans for the tour.

Visits to the rice fields of Arkansas and the Arkansas Rice Growers Cooperative Association in Stuttgart, Ark., really were interesting. I was able to see each step involved in the production and packaging of rice for market. In Nicholas County, we think we have seen large farms. Have you ever seen 500 acres of rice in one field? And the large grain storage silos, they really are big. For instance, the Rice Growers Cooperative I mentioned above have storage facilities for 55 million bushels of rice. The influence of this tremendous facility has been a great deal to the farmers in this area of our country. In fact, they handle approximately 12% of the rice grown in this country. We also visited the International Paper Co., manufacturing plant at Stuttgart.

After eight years of darkness, the lights came on again at Indian Fort Theater in the Berea College Forum. The amphitheater formerly named "Wilderness Road" is a new outdoor drama, "The Daniel Boone Story," will premiere Saturday, June 25, at 8 o'clock and continue nightly, with the exception of Sundays, through September 5.

The production is directed by Joe Johnson, director of the theater at Eastern Kentucky University, assisted by Kenn Keith.

The historical and educational drama traces the major events in Boone's life from 1772-1792, and is interspersed with many colorful songs and dance recitals to the era. Lyrics for the production were written by Jesse Stuart.

The cast is composed of 49 actors known as the Boone Players, Inc. The show is sponsored by the Richmond Exchange Club, a non-profit organization.

This outstanding drama promises an evening of full entertainment for the entire family.

Ellis Park Races  
Ellis Park will present nine races on Wednesday Saturday and Labor Day during the 38-day 1966 meeting, July 23-September 5, inclusive.

H.F. Moroney has been approved as a steward by the Kentucky State Racing Commission to replace Jack S. Young, retired. The track gates will open July 1 to receive the 1966 season's racing.

In making the announcement, President Lester E. Yeager, said that requests for stalls had exceeded 1,000 and that he was considering setting a maximum limit of 25 horses for a stable in order to accommodate more horsemen.

"We can't turn down old friends," he said in mentioning that large stables had applied for as many as 40 stalls.

With nine races on the six Wednesday programs, the track will set a record in number of races (218) for one meeting. Moroney has been associated with racing many years as a Kentucky breeder and official. He has served as Secretary of the Kentucky State Racing Commission and as Illinois State Steward at Cahokia Downs and Fairmount Park.

Young, who lives at South Bend Indiana, gained the respect of the horsemen and the management during the 26 years he was steward at Ellis Park.

"Mr. Young knew all the rules of racing and was a just and able administrator—a straight down the road gentleman,"
