Washington Report From Your Congressman

CONGRESS' CONCERN Over Hallucinogens Is No Illusion

Mounting concern over the increasingly widespread use of hallucinatory drugs by young people, made LSD and other such drugs the subject of hearings before two Senate Committees this past week.

The Senate Judiciary Special Subcommittee on Narcotics has before it legislation proposing a Narcotic Addict Rehabilitation Act which would make the use or possession of hallucinatory drugs a criminal offense.

The Senate Committee on Government Operations, Subcommittee on Executive Reorganization, is focused on the Federal Government's capacity to coordinate important medical research at the same time, provide safeguards to prevent the escape and unauthorized use of the drugs.

Many witnesses made repeat performances before both Senate Committees. The new dynamic energetic Commissioner of the Food and Drug Administration, Dr. James L. Goddard, in his testimony, opposed making the use of the hallucinatory drug illegal and predicted that his agency could stamp out the black market in LSD under the present Drug Abuse Act of 1965. Under this Act, the agency has the authority to arrest those who make or peddle LSD and other such drugs, and also to seize the drugs and equipment used in producing them. The law, however, does not permit the arrest of those who possess the drugs for personal use.

Dr. Goddard expressed concern that, if possession were made a criminal offense, it might place perhaps as much as 10 percent—or hundreds of thousands of college students—in the category of criminals and discourage any who suffered violent reactions, from seeking needed medical assistance. He further pointed out this would cut off a principal source to his agency in apprehending the makers and peddlers of the drugs. Dr. Goddard said that his agency would prefer to move against the makers and sellers and that the FDA plans a large educational program to alert young people to the dangers of LSD and other such drugs.

Dr. Goddard, further, told the Committee any claim LSD had "mind-expanding" qualities, is pure bunk. Actually, he said, it is the reverse. "Simple tasks become more difficult." He said that the effects from the drug include hallucinations, serious mental changes, psychotic manifestations, nervous breakdowns and provoked suicidal tendencies.

While Dr. Goddard, medical official from the National Institute of Mental Health and the Surgeon General, opposed the enactment of criminal legislation, other witnesses urged that Congress enact legislation in the hope of preventing any further increase in the unauthorized use of these drugs. It was pointed out that several states have nearly completed legislative action on state laws which would make sellers and users of hallucinatory drugs subject to the same

penalties that now apply to sellers and users of narcotics.

A member of the staff of the Senate Committee on Government Operations, who made a special survey of eight ghost towns around the country at the request of the Committee, reported that the use of LSD is limited but increasing, and that it most fascinates youngsters striving for intellectual growth or middle class security. He advocated government regulation of the elements of LSD which can be extracted from cactus and created artificially.

As can be seen, the tremendous problem facing the country and the concern of parents of young people, in a matter of equally deep concern to Congress. Congress does not want to enact restrictive legislation which might prevent medical advancements in the treatment of certain illness, but Congress also must decide to what degree it

should enact such legislation in order to protect young innocent persons from personal tragedy. It is not an easy decision and there is little doubt but Congress will hear many more witnesses and deliberate for many hours in order to arrive at a decision which would bring the most benefit to the greatest number of people with the least amount of danger for potential abuse.

"Wholesome and Salubrious"

Senator Everett Dirksen of Illinois recently had some kind words for community newspapers. He credited the small community newspapers of America with having a "wholesome and salubrious effect upon the citizens of the country." In 1660, he pointed out, "the first newspaper in Boston and supplicatory authorities, but the spirit of journalism remained undaunted, and 14 years later the first of many community newspapers was successfully established.

Attention was recently called to the weekly newspapers by inauguration of a travel-writing contest for weekly editors under the sponsorship of the Department of Journalism of Southern Illinois University and the American Oil Company. The purpose of the contest is to put the spotlight on little-known or forgotten corners of America. It will support the President's new "Discover America" program, and the close-to-home tour's campaign of the American Petroleum Institute. It will open approximately 9,000 weekly newspaper editors. First prize will be \$500 and a trophy, with suitable additional runner-up prizes. James M. Patterson, director of public relations for the American Oil Company, in announcing the contest, said that "many motorists do not know all the historic, educational and recreational attractions of their home communities. Our travel-writing contest is to encourage weekly newspapers to throw light on such little-known or forgotten areas that are readily available by car locally or nearby, especially on weekend driving, and to recognize those editors who do outstanding writing about them."

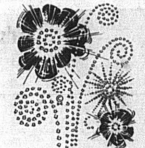
