To Our Citizens:

For the past four or five months our gas system lines have developed several leaks causing considerable loss both in gas and money to the City of Carlisle. This leakage is a dangerous situation and we ask all of you to help correct this matter. We are now in the process of checking and repairing these leaks and to this date some 15 or 20 leaks have been repaired. If you know of any small gas leaks, call the city office and give us the location and we will gladly check the leak at once.
 Several of the leaks we found have been in service lines. These lines are the property of home and business property owners and must be repaired or replaced by property owners. All lines up to the business line are the city's responsibility and we will repair and maintain these.
 If your pipes are bad, they must be replaced for your own safety as well as helping prevent the loss of gas.
 We are passing an ordinance requiring all bad lines to be replaced and covered type pipe be used. The city will stock this pipe for your convenience. We are not trying to be hard on anyone but we feel, and you should feel the same way, that this is a dangerous situation.
 Protect yourselves and your children and your property by being safe. We will gladly help all you can.

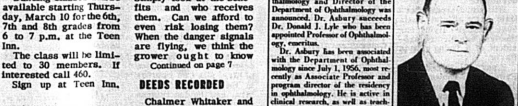

Bids Advised

—Frankfort, Feb. 23.—Bids for two monumental concrete surfacing projects in Nicholas County were received by the Highway Department on Monday, Feb. 21. The projects are: 1. Eastward T. Breathitt and Highway Commissioner Harvey Wartz announced the very heart of the tobacco program itself.
