4 H, FFA Date Set

Frankfort—Dates have been announced for eight 1966 4-H and Future Farmers of America District Dairy shows, following a meeting of the State 4-H and FFA planning committee.

Wendell Butler, commissioner of agriculture, said the dates for all events were moved forward because of the earlier than usual 1966 Kentucky State Fair at Louisville, Aug. 19-27.

The date of the 1966 show in this is: Aug. 1, at Cynthiana.

Approximately \$20,000 in State funds will be allocated for prize money to exhibitors participating in the eight shows, Butler said.

Among recommendations made by the committee was one to employ three extra judges to help decide competition. Another called for establishing guidelines for judges in order to achieve a uniformity in judging.
