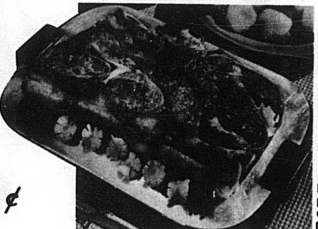

CORNEB BEEF AND CABBAGE
St. Patrick's Day or any day... Enjoy Tablerite Meat from IGA. Soak a 3 lb. Tablerite Brick of Corned Beef in cold water for about an hour. Drain, cover with cold water and gradually bring to a boil, simmer head and simmer gently 3-4 hours. (Boiling will toughen meat). Last 35 minutes of cooking drop & medium onion, & small peeled carrots and 1 medium yellow turnip cut in six. 10 minutes later add 4 small potatoes or 3 large ones cut in half. 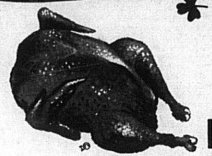
