Dairying is Big Business in Kentucky

The fact that dairying is big business in Kentucky is made clear when we realize there are close to a half a million dairy cows in the state and they produce slightly over two and one-half billion pounds of milk annually. Kentucky ranks second nationally in the production of evaporated whole milk. They also rank among the first five states in the nation in the production of cheddar cheese. Kentucky ranks 15th in the United States and 2nd in the South Central states in milk production. Of the milk used on farms in this state, consumption as fluid milk or cream amounted to 74 percent, 13 percent was fed to calves and 12 percent used for farm churned butter. Farmers sold 87 percent of the total production to plants and dealers as whole milk in 1964. In the South Central region, Kentucky ranks 1st in butter production. Nicholas county is shown to have 3,100 milk cows that are producing 14,229,000 pounds of milk according to the latest census figures. Figuring milk at a yearly average price of \$3.50 a hundred pounds would result in the value of this amount of milk at approximately \$500,000 per year.

Farmers Get Longer Time

Farmers are encouraged to keep an eye on the market so that they will be in position to get the best possible returns from the crops under price-support loans, Freeman M. Lockensmith, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation State Committee, said today.

The Chairman pointed out that a farmer has the opportunity to redeem his crops from Government commodity loans at any time prior to maturity by paying off the loan plus interest. By keeping track of the market, redeeming his crop and selling it when prices are most favorable and above the support price, the farmer will be able to take advantage of the higher prices.

Under a new system in effect for commodity loans, the final dates for filing price-support applications and loan maturity dates have been brought closer together to give farmers more time in which to make judgments on the disposition of their crops.

During prior years, there was in some instances a space of several months between final availability dates for loans and the loan maturity dates. Now, however, producers of price-supported commodities will be able to secure price-support coverage through loans or purchases on eligible quantities at any time between harvest and about one month before the loan maturity date. Maturity dates for the different crops are March 31 for sorghum and wheat; April 30 for barley and rye; and July 31 for corn and soybeans. Final dates for filing applications for price support on 1965 crops are approximately 30 days prior to the particular loan maturity date.
