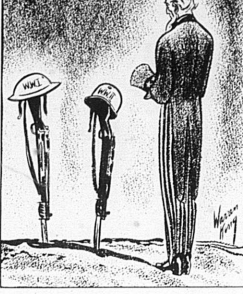
Kentucky Farm Bureau Fed.
