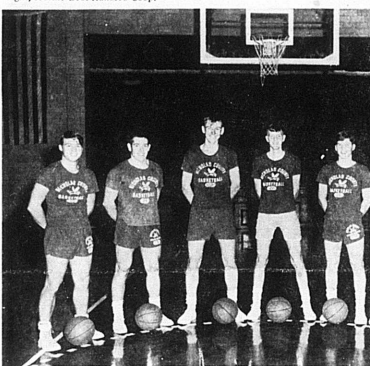

Cancer Cures In Local Area

New York —A new survey by the U.S. Public Health Service shows that cancer continues in the country, shows light on the incidence of lung cancer as well as all other forms of the disease. The number being cured is rising, however.

Locally, it finds cancer is responsible for 17.4 percent of the mortality. The survey, with figures from all parts of the country, shows light on the cancer picture in each area. It gives data on the incidence of lung cancer as well as all other forms of the disease. Its release comes at a time when special interest is being focused, because of the International Cancer Congress just held in Tokyo, on the progress that is being made in coping with this scourge.

The 17.4 percent toll recorded in the local area is compared, in the PHS report, with that in other sections of the country. In the United States as a whole it amounts to 16.1 percent and in the State of Kentucky, to 14.4 percent.

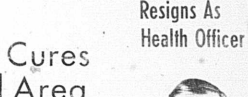
