Agree Or Not

I Say What I Think

Frankfort, Ky.—Kentucky Republicans are looking hopefully to taking over the reins of state government in the November 1967 election after their remarkable showing early this month.
They look at U.S. Senator John Sherman Cooper's staggering 209,000 vote and the election of three congressmen where they had only one before. The two congressmen are William G. Cowger, former Louisville Mayor, and M. Gene Snyder, also of Louisville, who took over in the realigned Fourth District.
But there is an important factor that they may overlook in their early factor that is political history says, and observers here speculate on this, that it is mischievous for the Republicans to win when they are ousting and entrenched regime of one faction of the Democrat Party.
If Highway Commissioner Henry Ward, the administration's candidate, wins the May primary, history shows the Republican chances would be better. But, if the anti-administration Democrats nominate former two-time Gov. A. G. Chandler or Lt. Gov. Harry Lee Waterfield, then their chances would be slimmer.
The theory behind this is that if the administration is ousted by the opposing political faction of the Democrats, the people feel they have "thrown the rascals out" and this works against the Republicans in November.
Best chance for the Republicans, who are outnumbered two to one in registration in this state, is in the opportunity of "throwing the rascals out" an accepted political definition in Kentucky that isn't an ignominious connotation.
The record shows the Republicans can do this in about 20-year cycles, but they just hold on one term. As one punster said, "The Republicans can mess it up in one term, and it takes the Democrats 20 years."
Donaldson was Keen Johnson's man, and Johnson had been put in the governor's office by A. B. Chandler. That was three terms for that faction of the Democrats.
In 1947 former Gov. Sen. Earle C. Clements defeated Republican Eilon Dummitt by a 100,000 margin. In 1951 Lt. Gov. Lawrence Werberly clipped Eugene Miller by 42,000 votes.
But Chandler came back in 1955 to defeat Werberly's choice, former Gov. Bert T. Combs, and Chandler rolled up a record 180,000 against John M. Robinson.
E. M. Sampson, 77-81, was the last Republican governor before Willis in 1943. History shows since 1893 the Republicans have never been able to win twice in a row, and it shows each of the two Democrat factions have held the office six times since then, but neither faction has been able to hold it more than eight years. They've lost on each third-term bid.
It was a third term bid by Chandler-Johnson-Gowen succession that Willis beat.
