Once in a great while there comes along a movie which combines the poignant ingredients referred to generally as "heart," with the suspense, sense of excitement and adventure, and with bonhomie and wholesomeness.

This all-too-rare combination, which appeals warmly and satisfyingly to every viewer, is represented now by Universal's "And Now Miguel," a Technicolor feature filming of the Newbery Award winning novel by Joseph Krumpholtz, telling the yearnings of a small boy in northern New Mexico who hopes to prove himself a man, and thereby to accompany his father, uncles and older brother to the mountains with the family flock of sheep.
