Franklin K. Key-While the government calendar here indicates this is the "lame duck session" for the governor the opposite seems to be true for Edward T. Breathitt.

He is carrying forward in vigorous style as his two predecessors--A. C. Chandler and Art C. Combs--did in making sweeping progress after the second legislative session.

It usually takes a governor his first legislative session to get his program established and, many times, implemented in his second session. Breathitt got the \$76 million bond issue passed in 1962, and has just come into use of much of the money for the road-building program, and the capital improvements program for colleges and other state agencies.

Of this amount \$139 million is for road construction, chiefly the Interstate System, and \$37 million for capital improvements.

This was about the same story for Governors Chandler and Combs. The timetable on bond issues and Chandler's administration.

Breathitt, by no means, will be able to spend all of the bond issue money, during his term, as was the case with the other two governors. It is a continuing program of progress.

A new distinction Breathitt may have is that when he was campaigning it was thought his job would be that of "caricature" in carrying out the program laid down by Combs. But the urge of progress throughout the nation has pushed him into the forefront as having a larger program and spending more money than did either of his two predecessors.

The State Chamber of Commerce took Western Kentucky last week gave Breathitt a sounding board to carry the story of progress to the people on their main streets, and to other Kentuckians through the press.
