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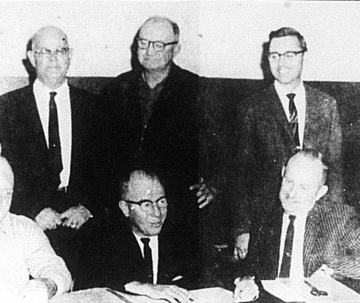
Wilderness Road Girl Scout Fund Drive

National School Lunch Week Oct. 9-15

The National School Lunch Program this year marks the 20th anniversary of serving nutritious, monthly lunches to school children across the country. By Presidential proclamation, the week of Oct. 9-15 will be "National School Lunch Week". Its theme will be "School Lunch Serves the Nation".

During the 1965-66 school term more than 7,000 public and non-profit private schools served lunches daily to some 18 million youngsters.

The National School Lunch Act of 1946 was created "to safeguard the health and well being of the Nation's children, and to encourage the domestic consumption of nutritious agricultural commodities and other foods." It is administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

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Man Found Shot By Fire Volunteers

David Sandys, of the Hickory Ridge section of Nicholas County, was found shot in the head by members of the County Fire Department Tuesday morning between 11 and 12 noon. The apparently self-inflicted wound was made with a .38-caliber pistol just above the right ear.

Sandys was found in a barn near his house which was destroyed by fire. He was to have been a witness at the trial of Brooks Russell, Tuesday morning, and failed to appear. Sheriff J. Maurice Cameron was dispatched by the judge to locate him and reported back at 10 a.m. that he could not find him.

The charge against Russell was illegally selling whiskey in the county. The case was dismissed on recommendation of the Commonwealth.

His condition is reported critical at the Good Samaritan hospital, Lexington where he was taken.
