

LET'S LOOK IT OVER

Frankfort—Although polls show a majority of Kentuckians favor the revised state constitution proposed for adoption in the Nov. 8 election, they also show large numbers of voters still undecided. Oliver Cuyale of New York reports that a sampling of opinion taken by his well-known firm shows a three-to-two preference for revision of the old document, but also reveals some 40 per cent of the voters have not made up their minds. A similar poll of some 400 persons taken in Louisville and Jefferson County by Raymond A. Kemper and Associates indicated that while 59 per cent opposed it, 16 per cent were still undecided.

This indication on the part of these sizeable segments of voters is traceable, I feel sure, to the fact that they have not taken the opportunity to read the new charter and compare it with the old. I view the revision film, "To Become a Governor," as a most timely and helpful device. The revised charter of 15,300 words, which we strongly urge all Kentuckians to support in November, is 2,500 words shorter than the existing, gas-light document of 1941, and improvements are easy to note by those who make its acquisition.

1967, a few months after the new constitution would become effective, and under it, I cannot succeed myself. Furthermore, the new charter will not centralize power in Frankfort, as some have mistakenly or wilfully claimed. Under the 75-year-old document, cities and counties must go to Frankfort to get permission from the legislature to deal with local problems. The new constitution provides for more home rule. Local communities, under the revision, will have the right to choose their own form of government. They also will have the right to determine what officials they want to govern their communities and how these officials shall be chosen—at home by the people who live there and not in Frankfort by the governor or anyone else.

A Summary of the Proposed Kentucky Constitution Revision as it affects The Kentucky Legislature



THE ROLE OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY The elected General Assembly is the law-making body in Kentucky. The proposed Constitution Revision gives more continuity to the legislature and seeks to improve and strengthen its legislative functions.

ANNUAL 60-DAY SESSIONS The General Assembly would be in legislative session 60 days each year, rather than 60 days every other year as now provided by the Constitution. A two-thirds vote of the members could extend a session up to 30 more days.

SALARIES RATHER THAN PER DIEM PAY The revision provides for all legislators to be paid an annual salary in amount to be fixed by law. This would replace the present "amount-per-day" method of payment for legislators.

TERMS FOR MEMBERS OF HOUSE AND SENATE The 1891 Constitution provides for two-year terms for House members and four-year staggered terms for Senators. The Constitution Revision would provide four-year staggered terms for

House members and six-year staggered terms for Senators.

ANNUAL DEBT LIMIT State debts would be limited to 2% of general fund tax revenue for the preceding fiscal year. This would replace the present debt limit of \$500,000.

PROVISION FOR INSPECTOR AND EXAMINER The General Assembly would be authorized to appoint an inspector and examiner to conduct audits and other studies of public funds, as directed by law.

ELECTIONS EVERY TWO YEARS As it now stands, the Constitution requires an election in Kentucky every year. In effect, we have double elections because of the importance of primaries in Kentucky. The Constitution Revision would provide for elections every two years, held on even-numbered years, at the same time U. S. Representatives are elected. The terms of office of all elected officials would be adjusted to fit the biennial elections.
