State Police Examination

FRANKFORT—State Police plan to begin giving examinations for new troopers at local points rather than only at Frankfort, Governor Edward T. Breathitt said.
Breathitt said the change was being made because of the distance to Frankfort and the pressing need for additional, qualified recruits.
"We're looking for young men of courage who want action to fill a class beginning Nov. 1," Breathitt said.
The 1966 General Assembly provided funds for 50 more troopers this fiscal year. The legislature also provided salary increases.
Breathitt emphasized that the State Police are seeking applications from all citizens and that he is hopeful Negroes will apply.

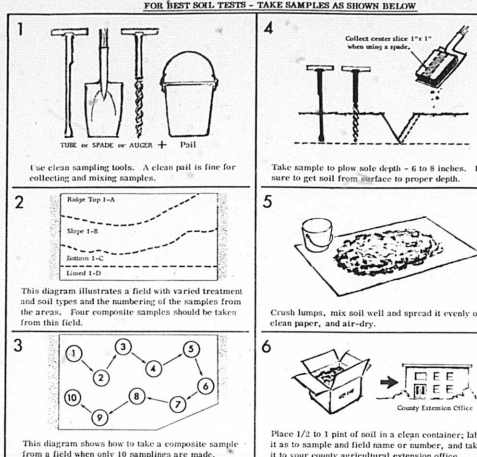

Soil Testing

More Nicholas County farmers are testing their soil in the fall. There are a number of reasons for testing in the fall. The soil is in better condition to take samples. The results are just as good as those from samples taken in the spring. The soil laboratory isn't rushed and results can be obtained faster. Farmers will have plenty time to shop around for the analysis fertilizer desired and may even make a saving by purchasing early. It pays to test now.

SOIL SAMPLING INSTRUCTIONS

1. Soil testing, coupled with treatment and cropping history, is the best guide available for determining your lime and fertilizer needs.
2. If you take a good soil sample, you will get a good soil test.
3. It is best to take soil samples when it is dry enough to plow.
4. Do not take soil samples in an area or before an open fire.
5. Avoid unusual, small areas such as mounds, eroded areas, old lime piles, fertilizer bands, etc.

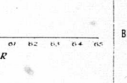
Repairman's Blunder

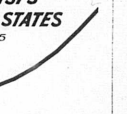

KENTUCKY'S TOURIST INDUSTRY EXPANDS

Tourism is "big business" in Kentucky with out-of-state tourists spending more than one-quarter of a billion dollars last year, according to a report by University of Tennessee economist Dr. Lewis C. Copeland. The latest Copeland report on Kentucky tourism shows that all travel spending brought the tourist-dollar total to more than \$175 million. The 1965 figures represent a nine per cent increase over 1964 tourist spending in Kentucky and \$150 million more a year than tourist spending just one decade ago.
