SCS, ASCS, Extension Service, etc. the adopted critical area conservation program is designed to stimulate pasture and hay establishment. This is needed to support much needed expanding livestock population.

Cooperation and Assistance of Agencies
Coordinated effort is necessary in the fulfillment of conservation objectives. Many agencies meet jointly for the purpose of determining some of the conservation problems, how best to solve the problems, and who will help get the job done.

The USDA Soil Conservation Service representatives, William F. Threlkold, Lucien T. Robinson, and Stanley C. Alexander, give technical assistance to farmers in the planning and application of conservation work. SCS personnel work in this and Robertson County.

The Conservation Service with its County Agent and Home Demonstration Agent has furthered the cause of conservation.

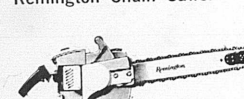

A Summary of the Proposed Kentucky Constitution Revision as it affects Kentucky's Executive Department

ELECTED OFFICIALS The proposed Constitution Revision provides that the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General and Auditor of Public Accounts shall be elected by the people. Other present state offices would be determined by the legislature.

SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION The Constitution Revision provides for an elected State Board of Education which will choose the Superintendent of Public Instruction. This would be a non-partisan election by districts. Now the Superintendent must seek office every four years in a partisan election.

TERMS OF OFFICE All elected officials would continue to serve four-year terms. The Constitution Revision would allow elected state government officers — the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General and Auditor of Public Accounts — to be elected to two terms in succession. (The present Governor and other elected officers could not succeed themselves.)

WHEN GOVERNOR IS ABSENT FROM STATE The Constitution Revision would allow the Governor to retain his powers whenever he left the state. Under the present Constitution, the Lieutenant Governor assumes these powers any time the Governor is absent from the state. And when this occurs, the Lieutenant Governor is paid the equivalent of the Governor's salary. This section is left out of the Proposed Revision, and it further stipulates that the Lieutenant Governor would be paid an annual salary for all of his duties.

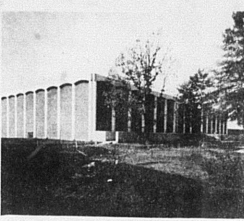

The dedication of the William J. Hutchins Library will take place on the Berca College Campus Tuesday and Wednesday, Oct. 25 and 26. This event will mark the fruition of years of hoping and planning. Thinking about the new library began about six years ago and the definite planing four years ago.

The new library has the physical dimensions to function in such a manner that the students of the college and the township of Berca. The three-level structure occupies 22,000 square feet of area. It has shelving capacity for 300,000 volumes and 1,000 periodicals. It will seat 500 people at a time. The open-shelf design will give the user ready access to all books and periodicals. And since the present collection of the library consists of about 60,000 volumes and 800 current periodicals, there will be room to grow.

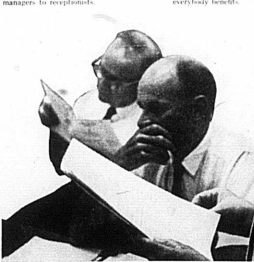
