Next Season's Crop Can Be 'Started' Now
Lexington—Some what this fall on next season's crops will make spring work loads lighter, says C. C. D. Corley, University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service soils specialist.
1) Take soil samples and have them tested. Research shows that test results of fall soil sampling are as reliable as spring sampling.
2) If lime is needed on fields, spread it this fall. Ground lime is firmer to work in. Limestone will be more beneficial to crops next spring if it has time to react with the soil over winter.
3) Spread needed phosphorus and potash this fall. These two plant nutrients do not leach out. They can be applied on fallow land for next season's crops. Wait till spring, however, to apply nitrogen. It will leach out.
