is selling at 40 cents a pound, while registered seed is 60 cents. Farmers naturally are inclined to buy and plant the lower priced seed. This is all right, Fort-embry points out, for those farmers who want to raise the quality of farm seed. But it isn't work for those farmers who want to harvest seed next spring and sell it as certified seed. Seed can be certified only when produced on fescue grown from "registered" or "foundation" seed. If registered seed is planted this fall, certified seed can be sold from it next year and also for the four succeeding years. Registered seed, in turn, is grown from "foundation" seed, which can be bought only from the Foundation Seed Committee of the University of Kentucky Agronomy Department. Foundation seed produces registered seed for three years, and certified seed for the 4th and 5th years.

Police Judge Questions Fine Reductions

Mayor Power brought to council attention the matter of discrepancy in the police court books of 518. Police Judge Jim Williams stated this amount was promised to be paid by the fine payer on a particular day. Judge Williams stated that in the case, he would suspend the fine to allow the books. Judge Williams inquired as to whether fine on his books of \$243. Mayor Power said this fine was reduced to \$100 and paid at the city building. The question was raised as to who has the power to reduce fines on sentences imposed at police court.
