Special Soil Health attachments will increase the scope of service that can be rendered in doing conservation work. More than 5,400 pounds of fertilizer has been obtained in recent years by Jones through the SCD from the Revolving Fund, administered by the State Department of Soil and Water Conservation.

This is one of the first conservation "contract" jobs undertaken in the county. Farmers, like other businessmen, like to know in advance the cost of applying planned conservation practices before construction. Especially is this true for big projects costing several thousands of dollars. Usually earth moving work is done at an hourly rate. To enable the farmer to know the exact cost of a specific practice, Fred Jones has started contracting to do specified practices to meet plans and specifications prepared by the Soil Conservation Service.
