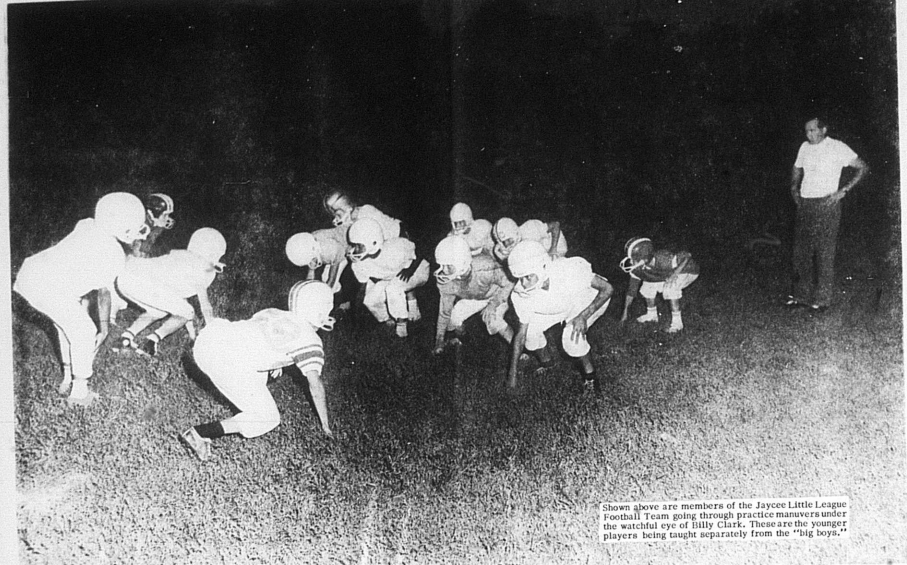

Production Credit Association

This business, located in the Deposit Bank building on Locust Street, is managed by Joe Crouch, Joe is a native of Berhel (Iath County) and came to Carlisle in 1953. Friday—Farm Machinery. Keep all farm equipment in safe operating condition. Keep guards and safety devices in place. Always stop machines before unclogging, servicing or adjusting. Keep small children from working machines. Retool only cool engine. To avoid tractor upsets or backward flips; slow down when turning up or on rough ground; hitch only to drawbar; set wheels wide; be cautious while working on slopes, uneven ground or around ditches. Keep a fire extinguisher and first aid kit on tractors and self-propelled equipment. Farm machinery should be properly lighted and well marked with warning devices such as flags, reflectors and Slow-Moving Vehicle Emblems for better safety on roads.

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Curing Barn Preparation

Lexington—Getting the tobacco barn in shape for proper curing is a big item in a successful barley program, says Ira Maasie, UK Cooperative Extension tobacco specialist.

Growers should know the space needed to house their crop, and have en-

ough room to house the crop under the poorest curing conditions. Before housing time, barns should be cleaned. Take out straw fodder, old tobacco, etc. Make sure the floor is dry. During housing, pick up loose leaves from the floor. "Housecleaning" will start from such decaying leaves. Ample air circulation is necessary. More side ventilators can be added. Weeds and brush must be cut away from around

the barn. The barn itself should be fully exposed to wind and sun. Tier racks should be in place, in good repair, and enough sticks on hand at start of housing to handle the crop. About 1,700 sticks per acre of tobacco are needed. Provisions should be made for curing covers and fuel before the crop is housed. And remember: The curing barn is a place for "making good curing weather."

Tips Given On Fuel To Use In Curing Barns Lexington—Use of heat

from artificial sources is one way to help prevent rotting of tobacco in curing barns, says Ira Maasie, UK Agricultural Extension Service specialist. Heat is needed to prevent rotting because tobacco should go in and out of "case" once every 24 hours. When curing leaf comes in case (or high order) and remains longer than 24 hours, Maasie points out, "the familiar" rot starts to develop, reducing weight and quality.

But the right type of heat in the barn can pre-

vent this situation. Some widely used fuels are coke, and natural and propane gas. There are other fuels but they are more expensive and have not received wide acceptance. Heat should first be applied after the tobacco has been properly wilted (water lost and color started changing from green to yellow). Heat should be used only in periods of stress, or when the tobacco is high in case (high moisture content). Heat should never be used continuously
