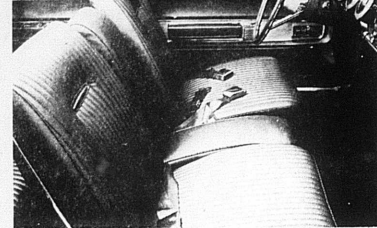
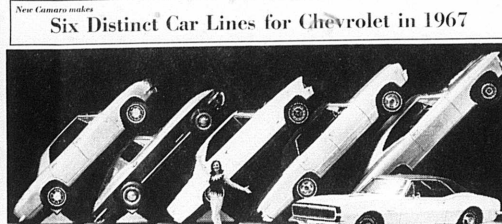

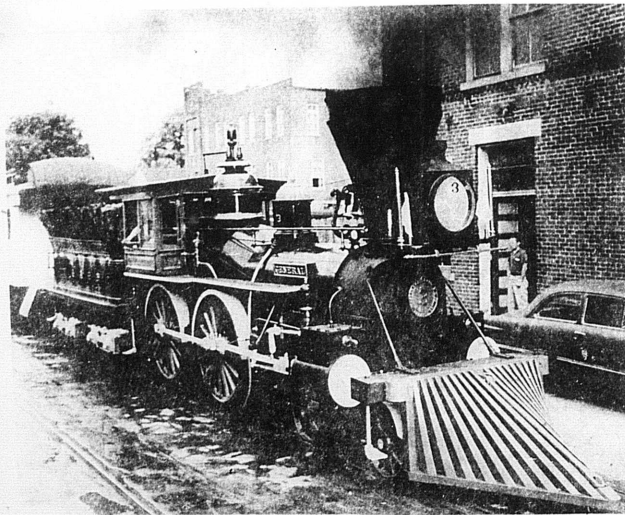

**All Steam'd-Up
For The Governor's Conference**

A GENERAL will be on hand to greet delegates to the Southern Governor's Conference meeting September 17-20 at Kentucky Dam State Park. This General, a 11-year-old steam locomotive most famous during the Civil War and its antique day coach will haul delegates at the conference on special excursion trips over hugh Kentucky and Harlan Dam. The trips will be sponsored by the Louisville and Nashville Railroad, present owner of the General, and the Illinois Central Railroad, over which line it will travel. This will be the engine's first appearance under its own power since it went to the New York World's Fair in 1965.

Probably the best known steam engine in America, the General made its run to fame April 12, 1862, when it was commandeered by a group of Yankee raiders at Big Shanty, Ga., on the Western and Atlantic Railroad (now the L&N). The ensuing chase and capture by a resolute band of Confederates made one of the most thrilling stories of that conflict.

The famed engine was put in operating condition by the L&N in 1962 after having been displayed at Chattanooga, Tenn., for 72 years. In 1964, on the centennial of the chase, the engine made a spectacular re-run over the same territory.

During the ensuing three years, the General traveled nearly 24,000 miles, some 12,000 of which were under its own power. L&N officials estimated more than a million people either rode the General's coach or boarded it to visit the museum section between 1962 and 1964 during stops at nearly 300 cities in 17 states.
