The week, "Industry Appreciation Week," the Carlisle-Nicholas County Chamber of Commerce, takes this opportunity to point out another segment of this area's economy — Clay's Seed Company. From a humble beginning in 1930 this company has grown to be a leader among the tobacco seed companies of this state, and the other seven-state area which includes Virginia, North Carolina, Tennessee, Ohio, Indiana, West Virginia, and Missouri.

## Lower Heart Toll in County in Prospect

Hear Sunday March Feb.26

(Special to the Mercury) — New York, Feb. 18—The President's designation of February 26th as Heart Sunday has stimulated special interest in Nicholas County in the local heart disease situation. According to the latest figures released by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, no less than 600,000 percent of all deaths in the local area are due to heart disease, stroke and other ailments of the cardiovascular system. Nationally, by way of comparison, they are responsible for 4.2 percent of the total mortality and, in the state of Kentucky, for 58.3 percent of it. High priority is now being given to an all-out assault on this number one killer. Many millions of dollars are being spent on research and methods to control high blood pressure, to safeguard against rheumatic fever, to prevent repeat heart attacks and to treat heart failure.

Forecasting heart attacks may also become possible, it states, by virtue of studies on fat and sugars in the blood stream. Doctors would then be able to detect possible coronary victims early and be able to take preventive measures. The government's most recent figures, based on a national survey, show that there were 88 heart deaths among residents of Nicholas County in the year ending January 1, 1966, with strokes responsible for 24 of them.
