More than 100 Kentucky high school teachers last year engaged speakers and experts in the Visiting Scientist Program sponsored by the Kentucky Academy of Science with headquarters at the University of Kentucky.
Dr. Roger W. Harbour, UK zoologist and the program's director, said the free service to all Kentucky high schools has been expanded this year—its third year—by adding speakers from a wide array of scientific fields.
The purpose of the program is to encourage an interchange of ideas among high school students and to brief them on what is going on in the world of science.
The visiting scientists, besides lecturing students and advising them on a possible scientific career, counsel teachers on problems they may meet in their science and mathematics classes.
Supported by the National Science Foundation, the program has an alumni advisory committee. Dr. M. C. Calpender and Robert M. Boyer, University of Kentucky; Dr. W. G. Reed, Murray State University; Dr. C. G. Hamann, Auburn College; and Dr. Dwight Lindsay of Dr. Mary E. Wharton, Georgetown College.

GOV. BREATHITT SAYS

New Library Building Here Personifies Transformation In Public Library Facilities

This new library building we see here personifies a great transformation which has taken place across Kentucky in public library facilities. This transformation from a library program which had to struggle to survive to one which now is in full speed has taken place within a relatively short time. The turning point in achieving full implementation of our regional library program came when we approved a State Bond Issue in 1965 for capital construction.

Of course, no one knows better than the citizens of Carlisle and Nicholas Counties how difficult it has been to achieve this fine building and a substantial library program for much of this achievement because many of our fine citizens and organizations such as the Nicholas County Woman's Club were unenthusiastic for years, and I might add, kept their aim high for such a program as you have today.

As you know, I have had experience working at the local level in library program, and know something of the difficulties you have encountered. In 1954, I was instrumental in obtaining a small bookmobile for my own county of Christian, and became the first chairman of the bookmobile board there. I learned then that if our regional library system was to accomplish its purpose, our local communities must have substantial state and federal aid.

We meet here today in knowledge that we are meeting the library needs of Nicholas County and the other five counties in the Buffalo Trace Regional Library System — Harrison, Bath, Lewis, Robertson and Fleming — primarily because we have truly geared local, state and federal resources to that purpose.

This new building, the headquarters of this region, would not be here today were it not so. Of the \$116,495 this building cost, the local citizens put up \$34,415; State Bond issue money financed \$22,740 of the cost, and federal funds of \$59,339 provided the remainder.

This is just one of 91 regional library systems consisting of a total of 79 counties in Kentucky which are fully implemented and being expanded. This money will go for thousands and thousands of additional books, to develop more bookmobiles and acre-

to be put into service in Garrard and Logan Counties as soon as facilities can be accomplished for them. Perry County is another for which there are immediate plans for substantial improvement.

The library program here in Nicholas County is an example of the kind of program we expect to extend to all Kentucky counties. Last year alone, the State Department of Libraries sent here 1,407 carefully selected new books and 125 recordings. Since 1962 there have been over 12,000 books sent here by the State Library Department, and you can be sure thousands more books and recordings will be coming into your area for both the headquarters and the five bookmobiles which roam the six-county region.

We must not underestimate the value of our regional library system for the part it shall play in the achievement of better life for all our citizens. We know fully well that modern man can not for long maintain his economic posture without knowledge and education which will permit him to keep pace with the times.
