Creed C. Black, man-  
aging editor of The Chicago  
Daily News will address

William L. Ryan, Associa-  
tion Press news analyst,  
will speak.  
Black is a native of  
Hartian, Ky., and began  
his newspaper career as a  
reporter with the Puda-  
cal Sun-Democrat. He  
has been managing editor  
of the Chicago Daily News  
since 1954. Before that  
he served as vice presi-  
dent and executive editor  
of the Wilmington (Del.)  
Morning News and Even-  
ing Journal.  
He also is a former  
executive editor of the  
Savannah (Ga.) Morning  
News and Savannah Ex-  
press, and for nine  
years he was an editorial  
writer for the Nashville  
Tennessean. A gradu-  
ate of Northwestern Uni-  
versity, he received his  
master's degree from the  
University of Chicago.  
Ryan, who lives at  
Greenwich Court, Ire-  
land, Ky., is a frequent  
contributor to the Asso-  
ciated Press, and is a  
specialist on the Soviet  
Union. He currently de-  
voted most of his atten-  
tion to the political and  
ideological gaps which  
have developed between  
China and Russia.  
Ryan attended New York  
University and Columbi-  
a and was graduated from  
the American School of

Kingsolvers Write of Caribbean Experiences

January 3, 1967  
Dear William and Kay,  
I promised a letter  
when we arrived on St.  
Lucia, so here's a  
promise.  
Our first view of this  
small volcanic island in  
the southern Caribbean  
was of steep mountains  
rising out of the sea.  
Our DWIA plane landed  
between the coco nut  
palms and banana trees  
on one of the few level  
areas of the island. The  
mountains and the sea  
are unbelievably beau-  
tiful. The trade wind blows  
constantly thru the coco-  
nut palms and the cas-  
sarina trees, making the  
climate in this tropical  
zone most lovely. When  
the rains come, there is  
a sudden drenching down-  
pour.  
We are living on the  
hospital compound which  
is a miracle of itself.  
During the war, this was  
an Air Force hospital for  
wounded soldiers from  
North Africa. After the  
war it was abandoned.  
Then about 2 years ago,  
a group of men came  
here, decided the struc-  
ture could be made into  
very hard work reclaim-  
ing it from the tangle of  
vegetation and restoring  
the roof, etc., it stands  
as a well-kept, clean  
mission of mercy in the  
midst of poverty, mal-  
nutrition, and tropical dis-  
eases.  
Wendell is the  
doctor for our month's  
stay here, and already by  
"bamboo telegraph" the  
local grapevines, the land  
has reached villages on  
the far edges of the is-  
land and his clinics are  
long.  
Much of the culture  
here reminds us greatly

of our stay in the Congo.  
People carry large staves  
of business cut their heads.  
The steel hands and the  
singing have Congo sym-  
ptoms. West Indian style  
cooking, chickens, donkeys  
and pigs roam the island.  
Every morning we rise  
in the 6th and 8th grade  
school. The children work  
to finish their les-  
sons, and carry water to  
help with the washing,  
so that we can all be  
free in the late afternoon  
to swim in the surf, or  
hike along jungle paths  
to find iridescent hum-  
mingbirds, strange lizard  
and snakes, and exot-  
ic tropical flowers.  
There are only a few  
cars here, but when one  
comes barreling down the  
broadly paved road on  
the left side, it's diffi-  
cult to refuse to send  
our scurrying to the op-  
posite side of the road. Be-  
cause of the traffic, the  
local language is very  
strange French-African  
mixture known as Patois.  
The people are wonder-  
fully friendly.  
We have papaya, Ra-  
tuna, coconuts, plantain,  
yams, and millions of  
bananas. We have never  
eaten it before—quite de-  
licious. There are lots  
of mangoes and avocado,  
but this isn't the season  
for them.  
We can see St. Vincent,  
the next island down the  
Windward chain. It stands  
rising in the distance out  
of the sea to the South  
of us.  
With no telephone,  
radio, or television, we  
have very little to do  
what is happening in the

outside world.  
We hope all is well in  
Carlisle and we send our  
wish for a very happy  
New Year to both of you  
and to all our friends at  
home.
