## Local Income Gains Make Up for Inflation

(Special to the Mercury) NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—How much more money must the average Nicholas County family have at its disposal today to live on the same scale as it did ten years ago? To what extent have rising incomes locally compensated for the reduced purchasing power of the dollar? On the basis of data from the Tax Foundation and from other sources, local families have more than made up for that deterioration. The great majority of them have incomes today that provide them with a higher standard of living than they enjoyed back in 1956. According to the Tax Foundation's findings, a family that had an income of \$4,000 in 1956 must now have \$4,750 today, 18.8 percent more, just to break even. The \$7,500 family must now be getting \$8,925 and the \$10,000 family, \$11,764, to live on the same scale as before. In Nicholas County, the average family has done better than that, according to the Standard Rate and Data Service. From an income of \$3,304 in 1956, it advanced to \$4,697 by last year, an increase of 48.2 percent. To keep pace, wages would have to go up. And the higher wages would
