

# American Farmer Lagging Behind The People He Feeds in Income

LEADVILLE, Ky. — It's the weather, insects, disease. He puts out more to collect blue ribbons and medals and most of his work is a gamble, but the American farmer still feeds millions of Americans with his knowledge and skill. The total food bill exceeds behind the rest of the U.S. in per capita food consumption.

He has high responsibilities for the future. If he wants to keep on feeding and producing food for his fellow citizens, U.S. population increasing about 2 1/2 million persons a year; to keep these people fed, the U.S. farmer must produce more.

There are two factors primarily responsible for the lagging income of the farmer. One is the cost of other commodities and services.
