NICHOLAS CO. DIALS THE NATION

The dial service will serve 1500 customers in Carlisle and will cost \$500,000.

Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company announced last night plans to convert Carlisle's telephone system to dial operation at a cost of approximately \$500,000.

Harry M. Mitchell, Southern Bell's District Manager, in announcing the plans, said that it will be the most modern you can find anywhere.

Plans for the conversion include a new building on Chestnut Street. Also a major part of the work will be the installation of new "outside" equipment, mostly new telephone cables. Installation of central office equipment will be done by employees of the Western Electric Company, the manufacturing and supply unit of the Bell System.

Construction of the new building is scheduled to start in April and the entire system is scheduled to be ready for use later this year. The new dial system, according to Mitchell, will include facilities for the dialing of long distance calls directly by the subscriber. Direct Distance Dialing, or DDD as it is better known, is available to about 80 percent of Southern Bell customers in Kentucky.

The conversion to dial telephones marks a momentous milestone for Southern Bell, Mitchell said, "With the conversion to dial service, Southern Bell now will serve all our subscribers in Kentucky with dial service. This will put Kentucky a few steps ahead of the rest of the country, which still has considerable work to do before all the nation's telephones have dial service."

Mitchell said, "We are happy to have reached this milestone, and feel this is one good example of the tremendous growth experienced by Kentucky's economy. Over 1,500 customers in Carlisle will benefit from the dial telephone service. The \$500,000 being spent in providing the dial service is part of a \$32.4 million construction program for service improvement and expansion in Kentucky for 1967 by Southern Bell."

In preparing for the converter to the dial system, telephone installers have been installing dial telephones in subscribers' homes with approximately 66-68 percent of subscribers now having the new dial telephones in their homes. The system will continue to operate manually until the converter in November.

Frankfort, March 22—Bids for bituminous concrete surfacing on the Parisville Road (US 68) Road in Nicholas County will be received by the Highway Department on April 1, 1967, at the office of the Highway Commissioner, Mitchell W. Pittman, at Frankfort, Ky.

The project will begin at Ky. 36, 2,723 miles northeast of the Bourbon County line and extend to 1,414 miles southwest of Evansville, a distance of 4,837 miles.

Extensive Progress Shown In County

(Editor's Note: The following article on progress in Nicholas County has been set into two parts, due to its extreme length. The second part will be published next week.)

Frankfort—Nicholas County made extensive progress in 1966 by participating in State government activities such as highway construction, education, health and welfare, conservation and agriculture and tourism.

Among specific State government programs in which the county shared last year were:

HIGHWAYS—During the 10 months from Jan. 1 to Oct. 31, 1966, the State spent a total of \$531,259 in State and Federal funds to build and maintain roads in Nicholas County.

The State allocated \$133,347 for maintenance of 120 miles of county roads, \$47,793 for maintaining 150.5 miles of county roads under the State's county road aid program, and \$14,750 for the current 1966-67 fiscal year for the rural secondary program.

Among principal projects let to contract by the Department of Highways in Nicholas County in 1966 were: Blacklocking the Galloway Hill Road, 2.4 miles; the Barrettsville Road, 2.2 miles; East Union Road, 6.5 miles; and KY-32, from Carlisle to Flemingsburg, 20.1 miles.

EDUCATION—The State provided \$20,501 from State tax funds for Nicholas County schools during the 1966 school year. This combined with \$118,941 in local tax funds, provided \$208,587 for school salaries, \$35,700 for construction and equipment; \$41,610 for pupil transportation, and other services.

State allocations for textbooks in Nicholas County totaled \$11,410. During the year, the county received placed under departmental supervision or committed to department institutions.

These and other services to the county's children from the Child Welfare Department cost a total of \$5,266, excluding cost of institution operation.

The State of Kentucky for Handicapped Children provided treatment for 14 local youngsters.

Burley Program Clarified

Since Burley tobacco growers apparently turned down acreage-pounds marketing quotas in the special referendum held Feb. 27-March 3, the marketing quota program which operates through acreage allotments only will continue in effect for the 1967 Burley tobacco crop. The quotas on an acreage-only basis were approved for 1965-67 Burley tobacco crops by 99 percent of the growers voting in February, 1965.
