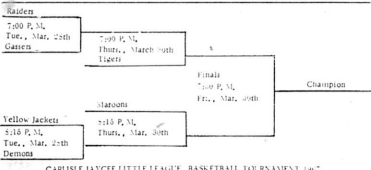

## 804,000 Cigarette Packs Consumed Here Reach To Paris, Almost, If Laid Side By Side

(Special to the Mercury)  
New York, March 25—What changes have Nicholas County residents made in their smoking habits since the government ordered cigarette manufacturers to put warning labels on each package?  
Practically none, according to the latest statistics on cigarette smoking in the area.  
The warning, which reads, "Caution: cigarette smoking may be hazardous to your health," has been almost completely ignored. Many people, in fact, have never noticed that there is such a statement on their cigarette packages.  
Figures released by the Federal Trade Commission, the Tobacco Tax Council and others indicate how ineffective it has been. They show that cigarette sales in the United States rose 2.9 percent in the past year despite all efforts to induce people to stop smoking.  
In Nicholas County, most people are smoking more than they did five or ten years ago, the reports show. Estimates place the total amount of cigarettes consumed in the local area in 1966 at 804,000 packs.  
By way of comparison, smoking was at the rate of 215 packs per person nationally, based on the 18 population, and 171 per person in the East South-Central States.  
And people are going to smoke more and despite all the health warnings, until we take a new approach to the problem, says a University of Michigan professor, Ross J. Wilhelms.  
"It is time," he declares, "that the government stop wasting our money and personnel on ineffective measures designed to reduce smoking."  
"It is time that we use some of the huge amounts of money going into research toward finding out what, if any, are the harmful ingredients in cigarettes and how to remove them effectively, while retaining the flavor of the cigarettes."  
How much does the average Nicholas County smoker spend for cigarettes? Approximately \$54 per year, it is estimated.  
The total bill for the community as a whole, was close to \$201,000 in 1966.
