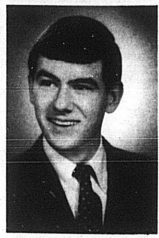

## Auto Inspection Fee Is Reduced To '2

Frankfort, Ky.— The State has reduced the \$2.50 fee for the mandatory vehicle inspection program and has eased seven standards of the program that went into effect this year.

The new inspection fee, announced Friday, is \$2.

Other changes outlined by Robert Sabrey, director of the inspection division in the state Department of Public Safety were:

—Windshields must be replaced only if vision is obstructed.

—Headlight aim will be checked but any correction will be voluntary.

—Whose need not be removed to test brakes.

—Parking brakes, ball joints and "tie-in-out" will not be checked at all.

—Tires will be approved if there is 1 1/2 inches of tread.

—Turn signals will not be required but must be operative if the vehicle has them.

—Special class vehicles used during daylight only need not have marker lights, cab lights and other special lighting equipment required for regular trucks. The special class applies to farm, coal and gravel trucks and well-drilling machines and the like.

The inspection division announced but apparently did not implement some of the changes outlined Friday. The announcement then was interpreted as an attempt to soften criticism of the program at a time when the legislature was considering changing the law.

A law passed by the legislature which would have required that when a vehicle changed hands was vetted by Gov. Louie B. Nunn Wednesday.

Nunn said he had been told by federal officials that anything less than mandatory annual inspection of all vehicles would cost the state approximately \$12 million a year in federal road money.

Helping children in need and to communicate is an important part of the year-around work of the Kentucky Society for Crippled Children, the Easter Seal Society.

The society's Hearing and Speech Center in Louisville offers services to hard-of-hearing children and children with hearing-caused speech difficulties. These services include intensive testing and evaluation of hearing problems, training in lip-reading, use of hearing aids and speech correction.

Last year, 346 patients from 47 Kentucky counties received hearing and speech services at the center. Hearing aids for 71 children were provided by the WIAS Crusade for Children Hearing Aid Fund administered by the Society. Easter Seal funds paid for other aids.

In 1967, matching \$5,000 grants from the WIAS Crusade and the Kentucky Society financed a hearing aid follow-up and hearing rehabilitation program.

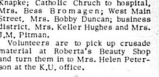
