Nicholas Soldier Gets Bronze Star

Specialist 4 James A. Dalley, Route #1, Moorefield, has been awarded the Bronze Star Medal posthumously for meritorious service in Vietnam during the period of May 5 to November 18, 1967.

The Bronze Star, the Nation's fourth highest combat award, was presented to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. James E. Dalley, at their home in Moorefield.

Specialist Four Dalley earned the award for outstanding meritorious service in connection with ground operations against hostile forces in the Republic of Vietnam. The citation stated "Through his use of initiative and professional ability, he consistently obtained outstanding results. He was quick to grasp the implications of new problems which were faced as a result of the ever changing situations inherent in a counterinsurgency operation and to find ways and means to solve these problems. The energetic application of his extensive knowledge has materially contributed to the efforts of the United States Mission to the Republic of Vietnam in assure that country in riding high tide of the communist threat to its freedom. His initiative, zeal, sound judgement and devotion to duty have been in the highest tradition of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Army.

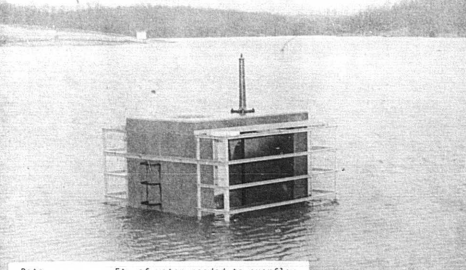
