Early Diagnosis
Can Save Lives

Frankfort.—The State Department of Health reports that 3 out of every 1,000 women tested in its cervical cancer program have cervical cancer.

The report is the result of one year operating the program. An appropriation by the Legislature for the program became effective July 1, 1966.

Dr. Donald Austin, cancer-control officer of the Department's Division of Epidemiology, says the national testing rate is 46 in 1,000.

During the first year of operation, more than 6,000 women took the Pap test in program clinics. Of 67 women whose tests showed the possibility of cervical cancer, 36 were diagnosed as having cancer. 26 are not having it, and 11 are taking further tests.

The report says that most of the 30 cancer cases were diagnosed early enough for an expected cure-rate of 100 per cent.

'No Grazing Period' Near
For Diversion Program

Farmers were reminded today grazing of dogspriced diverted areas under the 1968 feed grain program is prohibited between April 30 and Oct. 1, Freeman M. Hockensmith, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation State Committee, explains that farmers who are diverting acreage under the program have agreed not to graze the diverted acre during a specific 5-month period of the growing season and not to harvest a crop from diverted acres at any time during the year.

Farmers participating in the Conservation Reserve and cropland adjustment programs have agreed not to graze land diverted under these programs or harvest any crop from such lands during the life of the agreements.

Kentucky farms signed up to participate in the 1968 commodity diversion programs for corn, grain sorghum number about 61,000.
